Reflection on Today's Gospel

Glory be to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit

Last Sunday, Pentecost, was the last Sunday in Easter season. Today's feast of the Most Holy Trinity seems to enclose the Paschal season and the whole liturgical year in our celebration of the central mystery of our faith.

Moses, in the **First Reading**, reminds us of all that God has done for us. He is the one God, majestic and powerful, yet close to us.

St Paul, in our **Second Reading**, reminds us that we have received the Spirit as sons and daughters of the Father, whom, like Christ, we can call Abba.

In the **Gospel** the disciples receive the commission to go forth and baptise all nations in the name of the Trinity, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

We pray to grasp something of the mystery of the blessed Trinity as we contemplate these readings.

Government Regulations on Church Opening

As we resume attendance at Mass in our Church, we set out the following for weekend Masses –

- Baptisms will take place only in exceptional circumstances until further notice.

American activist, Dorothy Day, famously said “Don't call me a saint. I don't want to be dismissed so easily”. 41 years after her death, the Church has opened the case for her possible canonisation. Her journey led this single mother from atheism, communism and anarchy to radical Catholicism. She called all believers to fight racism, war and poverty. Her Catholic Worker Newspaper proclaimed the rights of workers and the poor, urged readers to radically give to one another, and espoused a complete pacifism in response to nuclear war.

She created ‘houses of hospitality’, sheltering and feeding New York City's homeless through the Great Depression and living among the poor that she served. She campaigned relentlessly for social justice, challenging Church and State along the way, frequently being jailed and mistreated.
